Emeritus Professor P.E.H. Hair was formerly professor of modern history in the University of Liverpool. The prime instigator of the Liverpool Medical History Society, he was its first chairman, retiring from office in 1994. He is Chairman of the Archives Committee of the Liverpool NHS Trusts.

Mark Harrison is Senior Lecturer in History at Sheffield Hallam University, where he teaches the history of medicine and of British imperialism in South Asia. He is the author of *Public Health in British India* (Cambridge University Press, 1994) and *Climates and Constitutions: Health, Race, Environment and British Imperialism in India* (Oxford University Press, forthcoming 1999). He has written many articles on the history of medicine and imperialism and medicine and war.
