'How the White Man brought the disease to the Country' Prof Peter Pharaoh Held on Tuesday 24<sup>th</sup> October 2017

The disease was a thyroid goitre, the country was Papua New Guinea and the consequence for women was mental handicap in their offspring.

Peter was a junior doctor training in London to be a physician. Wanderlust took him and Margaret to a primitive hospital in the PNG islands where he embarked on an epidemiological study that was to redirect his career and indeed the family's life.

There had been a surge in the incidence of infant mental handicap since the late 1950s. Peter and his colleagues recruited 8000 women of child bearing age into a trial of lodine injections or placebo and painstakingly followed them up across the country's mountainous terrain.

The reduction in affected babies in those treated was dramatic and returned to historic levels. White man had brought Salt to the country which contained substantially less iodine than that the natives obtained from a single spring in an inaccessible island location.

Illustrated with spectacular mountain panoramas, basic hospital facilities, and stories of injury and hardship, family Pharaoh's destiny, like that of the locals was to change evermore.
