"Clergy Behaving Badly"
The Reverend Fergus Butler-Gallie

Held on Tuesday 10th December 2019

Fergus is the recently ordained curate to the Liverpool Parish Church of Saint Nicholas. He had studied history and Czech -Slovak at St Johns College Oxford and theology at Cambridge University. In his mid twenties he has already authored two bestselling books.

In his talk, not sermon, he compared the role of doctors to that of clerics of whom he painted amusing portraits of idiosyncratic priests and bishops whose behaviours caused them to be included in his Field Guide to the English Clergy.

The Bishop of Exeter had been a poorly performing student but was well connected with means of his own and the portly vicar of Bude in Napoleonic times often sang on a rock in the Atlantic dressed as a mermaid. Another Cornish vicar built a barbed wire fence around his church during the Second World War whilst yet another preached to a congregation consisting only of cats.
